The Student Voter Bill

"A bill advocating for the implementation of student identification cards as valid voter identification in the state of Texas"

Whereas(1): Voter turnout in the 18-29 year old demographic in Texas is the lowest

demographic bracket at 15 percent in primaries; and,

Whereas(2): With 1.5 million people, or around 5 percent of the population in the state of

Texas enrolled in a higher education institution since 2016, the allowance of student identification as voter identification will help to increase the voter turnout

of 18-24 year olds; and,

Whereas(3): To vote in Texas, an individual must present a valid form of identification at the polls to be allowed to vote; and;

Whereas(4): A voter may either present one of seven "primary" forms of identification, those being:

- A Texas Driver's License issued by the DPS
- a Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by the DPS
- a Texas personal identification card issued by the DPS
- a Texas license to carry a handgun issued by the DPS
- a United States military identification card containing the person's photograph
- a United States citizenship certificate containing the person's photograph, or a United States passport
- or a secondary form of identification coupled with a Reasonable Impediment Declaration; and;

Whereas(5): A "supporting" form of voter identification is either:

- a valid voter registration certificate
- a certified birth certificate
- a copy of or original current utility bill
- a copy of or original bank statement, a copy of or original government check
- a copy of or original paycheck
- a copy of or original of other government document with voter's name and an address (original required if it contains a photograph); and;

Whereas(6): A Reasonable Impediment Declaration is a form that is required to be filled out by a voter who used a supporting form of identification that states why the individual was not able to present or acquire one of the seven forms of primary identification; and;

Whereas(7): While all forms of supporting identification required a name and address, the address on the piece of identification is non factor in an individual's ability to vote

since voting officials will default to the address put down on the voting application; and;

Whereas(8): Since students, according to Title 19, Part 1, Chapter 21, Subchapter B, Rule 21.21 of the Texas Administrative Code, must prove residency for tuition purposes before being enrolled in a higher education institution, student

identification can prove Texas residency for voters that have already registered to vote; and,

Whereas(9): Past attempts at reform for voter identification, such as SB 5, aimed to make student identification a primary form of voter identification; and;
