"A bill requesting students have the right to view materials graded by their instructors."

Whereas(1): The Texas A&M University Student Government Association is the official voice

of all students at Texas A&M University; and,

Whereas(2): Texas A&M University is committed to providing students with information that

allows individuals to make informed decisions about their academic future and

current standing; and,

Whereas(3): Student at Texas A&M University, College Station have been refused access to

view an exam that they have submitted; and,

Whereas(4): Currently, there is no rule outlining that instructors have to make graded material

available for students to view at anytime after submission.
